MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR



The 2025-26 academic year was a busy, challenging, and ultimately productive year. Like everyone in academic medicine, we faced significant external pressures in the form of decreased federal support for research, a devaluing of science and public health, and ongoing attacks on reproductive health. Despite these challenges,

the UW Department of OB-GYN pulled together and persevered in our mission areas of education, research, clinical care, and advocacy. Every year, I am increasingly grateful to work alongside everyone in the department as we continue to advance reproductive health in Wisconsin and beyond.

Comprehensive Educational Experiences

Our exceptional medical education programs are preparing the next generation of reproductive health leaders. Our **medical student curriculum** has expanded to include new educational experiences focused on reproductive health equity. The newly restructured **Resident Scholars Program** connects residents to research and scholarly projects that support their career interests. The four UW Department of OB-GYN **clinical fellowships** continue to recruit talented physicians for subspecialty training; the Reproductive Endocrinology and Infertility fellowship, which was established in 2024, welcomed the third fellow in August 2026. The Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education approved a permanent complement increase for the Maternal-Fetal Medicine fellowship, which can now match two fellows per class, eventually bringing the total complement of MFM fellows up to six.

Research and Discovery

Despite a year of strong external headwinds, our researchers persisted. The breadth of our research portfolio is impressive, and our faculty and staff work hard to maintain impactful research programs across the field of reproductive health. The Department of OB-GYN received significant federal and private support this year for our research programs, including: a grant to build a **data pipeline connecting UW Health and UnityPoint Health-Meriter Hospital maternal-child health records**, which will bolster our clinical research opportunities; a renewal to continue the **UW Collaborative for Reproductive Equity's work on abortion and contraception policy in Wisconsin**; and an exciting investment in reproductive biology translational science from the NIH in the **iPEnd Translational Postdoctoral Training Program**.

Clinical Excellence

U.S. News & World Report ranked UW Health University Hospital **#12 in the nation for Obstetrics and Gynecology services**. UW Health University Hospital was also rated as high-performing in gynecologic cancer surgery; **UnityPoint Health-Meriter Hospital was rated as high-performing in maternity care for uncomplicated pregnancy**. Our clinical programs are robust, and patient volume continues to grow year over year across our specialty and subspecialty areas. This year saw the successful establishment of a gynecology urgent care clinic; onboarding of new colleagues in the UW SMPH Department of Medicine and UW Health Northern Illinois who will improve gynecologic cancer care and access; and the creation of a new clinic to support patients with cardiovascular concerns in pregnancy.

Engagement and Advocacy

The Department of OB-GYN's Engagement and Advocacy platform aims to build strong relationships with organizations and individuals focused on reproductive health and health equity. Many members of the department contribute to this mission. This year, with support and encouragement from tireless advocates in the department, **Wisconsin extended Medicaid coverage to 12 months postpartum.** The department's Social Impact and Belonging leadership organized a symposium of healthcare providers, community experts, and scholars to facilitate a conversation about **trust and safety in pregnancy and postpartum care.** All of the department's engagement and advocacy work aims to serve and uplift the communities that sustain us, including our community of patients, partner organizations, supporters, and friends.

The remarkable, resilient faculty, trainees, advanced practice providers, researchers and staff of the UW Department of OB-GYN are committed to excellence in education, research, and clinical care. It is an honor to work alongside a department that is **unified in leading reproductive health forward!**

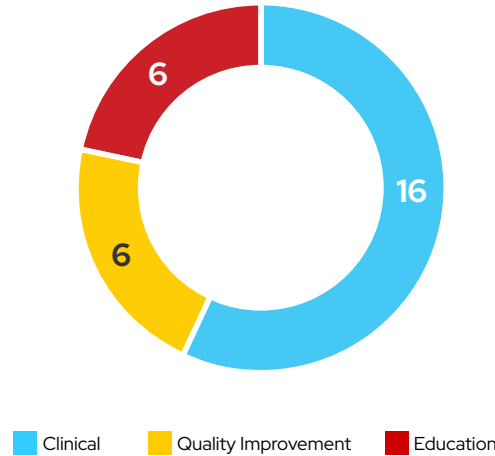
COMPREHENSIVE EDUCATIONAL EXPERIENCES

RESIDENT EDUCATION



In the newly-reorganized Resident Scholars Program, residents can choose research and scholarship projects that align with their interest areas. Scholarly activity for residents was strong this year: four graduating residents published their research projects; residents presented their work at 18 conferences; and residents published 10 peer-reviewed manuscripts.

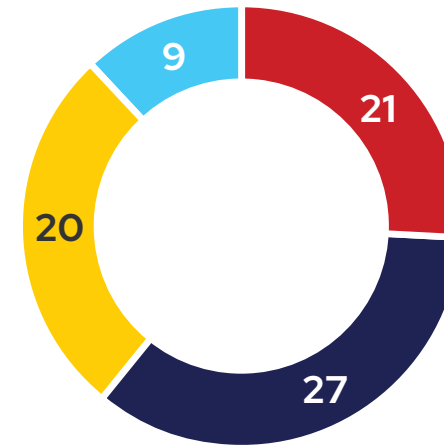
Integrated Program in Endocrinology T32 funding renewed for \$1.8 million



The [Integrated Program in Endocrinology](#) (iPEnd) Translational Postdoctoral Training Program has successfully been renewed! Led by Ian Bird, professor in the Division of Reproductive Sciences, and Jon Levine (Wisconsin National Primate Research Center), the training program is set to receive \$1.8 million over the next five years from the National Institute for Child Health and Human Development (T32HD101384).

iPEnd is a postdoctoral award that provides funding for both PhD and MD trainees to undertake translational studies in reproductive biology. In the coming year, the program will welcome Mary Fran Donovan, DO, who is currently a clinical fellow in the Division of Reproductive Endocrinology and Infertility.

Ryan Spencer becomes UW Health Designated Institutional Official for GME

As the DIO for graduate medical education, Dr. Spencer provides oversight and administration for each of UW Health's ACGME-accredited programs, ensuring compliance with the ACGME institutional, common, and specialty- and subspecialty-specific program requirements.



Tiffany Green receives UW-Madison Chancellor's Inclusive Excellence Teaching Award

Dr. Green was celebrated for developing impactful additions to the UW School of Medicine and Public Health curriculum: in 2022, Dr. Green introduced the course *Race in American Obstetrics and Gynecology*, the first of its kind for medical students which explores how race and theories of racial differences informed the development of American obstetrics and gynecology. Her course *Abortion in Wisconsin and Beyond: Exploring Medical, Public Health, and Social Science Perspectives* has been approved as a permanent addition to the medical school's catalog.



Laura Birkeland receives 2026 UW SMPH Dean's Teaching Award

Laura, who is a certified genetic counselor, currently serves as program director for the Masters of Genetic Counselor Studies program. She is extremely committed to education for genetic counselling students, extending to providing genetics education classes for medical students, and mentoring MFM fellows, OB-GYN residents, and genetics lab fellows.

***Data Link for Healthy Families* builds maternal-child health data pipeline**

One of the largest electronic health record (EHR) data sets in Wisconsin has a glaring omission: because patients who get prenatal care within the UW Health system deliver their babies in Wisconsin's busiest birthing hospital—which is part of a different health system—the data set does not include their birth outcomes.

To help solve this problem, the UW Department of OB-GYN proposed [*Data Link for Healthy Families*](#). Funded by a \$495,000 grant from the UW School of Medicine and Public Health and the Wisconsin Department of Health Services, *Data Link for Healthy Families* establishes the Maternal-Child Health Data Commons, which connects prenatal, postnatal, and infant care data from UW Health and private practice groups in Madison to the delivery and postpartum data in the UPH-Meriter EHR.

Researchers hope *Data Link for Healthy Families* can serve as a blueprint for future maternal-child health data integrations and expand opportunities for the UW School of Medicine and Public Health to lead multi-institutional research collaborations. In addition, the data link will help enhance clinical workflows and support evidence-based decision-making; facilitate in-depth investigations into the long-term effects of adverse birth outcomes on maternal and child health; and equip researchers, clinicians, and policymakers with data-driven insights that can impact policy and improve health outcomes across the state.

AWARDS AND GRANTS

UW Department of OB-GYN researchers work hard to maintain impactful research programs across the field of reproductive health. Just some of the 2025-26 funding accomplishments:

The pilot grant provides \$50,000 to study a new immunotherapeutic agent for ovarian cancer. *Investigating fusokine IL-6/1 as a novel immunotherapeutic agent against ovarian cancer* will be a collaboration with researchers in the Department of Medicine.



[Laura Cooney received ICTR Translational Basic and Clinical Research Pilot Award](#)

The \$50,000 pilot award supports *Functional and Structural Impacts of Polycystic Ovary Syndrome (PCOS) on Brain Health*, a collaborative project with the UW-Madison Department of Kinesiology that will study how PCOS, which can contribute to increased rates of type 2 diabetes, heart disease, and cognitive decline in women, may negatively affect brain health.



[Irene Ong received Igniting Interdisciplinary Innovation \(I3\) grant](#)

Dr. Ong received the \$250,000 I3 grant—meant to promote bold, cross-campus collaborations—for the project *From AI Innovation to Clinical Impact: Closing the Gap for Reliable AI-based Disease Screening*, in collaboration with colleagues from the UW SMPH, School of Pharmacy, and School of Computer, Data, and Information Sciences.

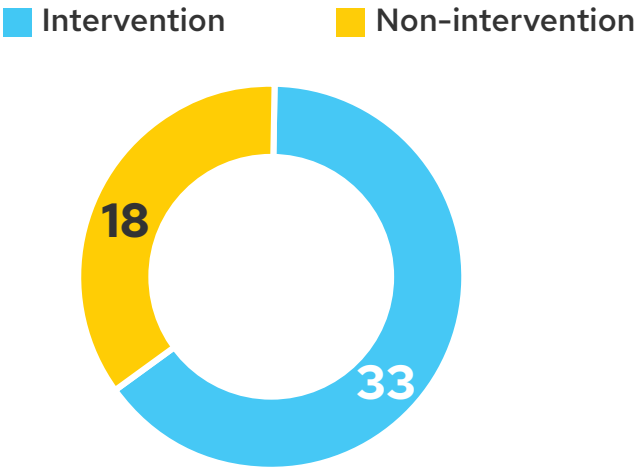


[Jessica Vazquez earned KO1 award from National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases](#)

Dr. Vazquez, a scientist in the Stanic-Kostic Lab, received \$658,368 over three years for the project *Sterile inflammation at the maternal-fetal interface and fetal immune programming in a non-human primate model*. Her study aims to understand how the in-utero environment impacts the developing fetal immune system, and the long-term immunological consequences of inflammation.

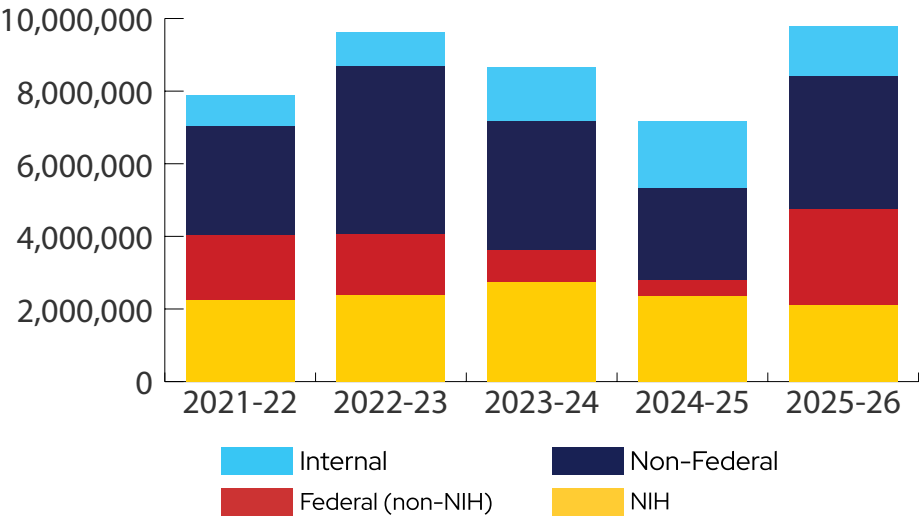

Cancer Clinical Trial Enrollments

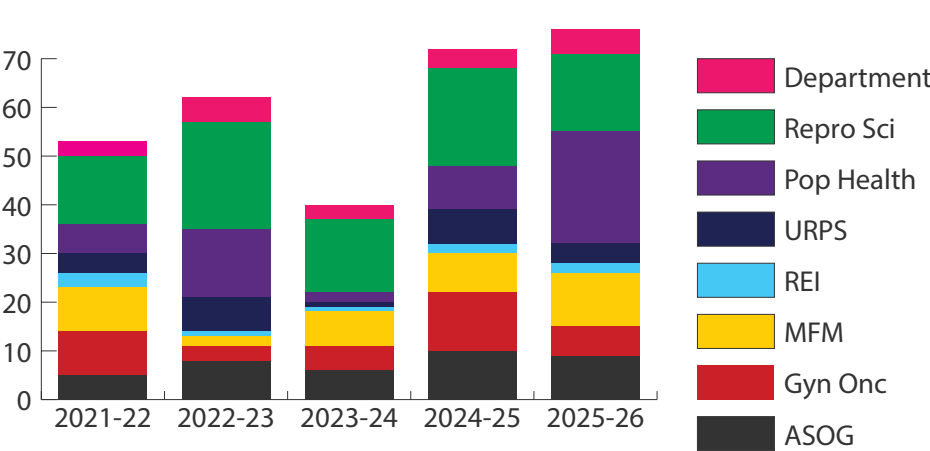

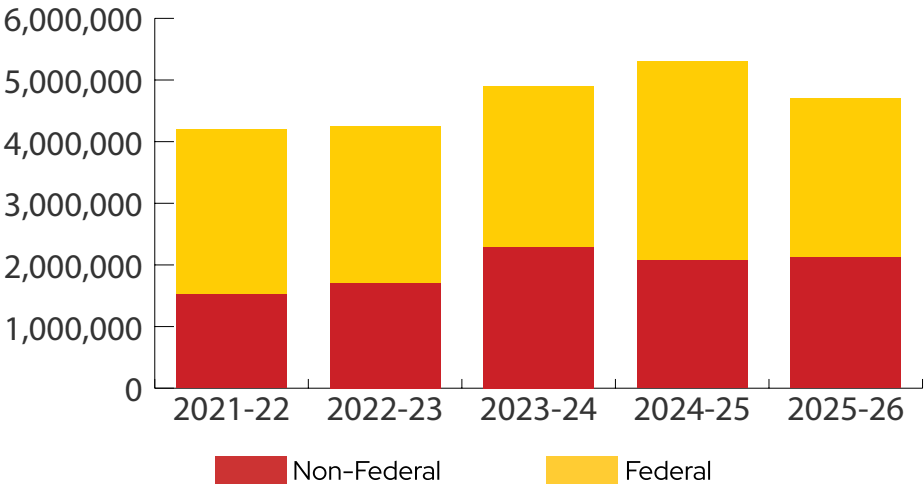

David Abbott retired after decades of fieldchanging PMOS/PCOS research and education

Dr. Abbott joined the faculty in the UW Department of OB-GYN and the Wisconsin National Primate Research Center in 1990; his central scientific achievement is the development of prenatally androgenized female rhesus monkey models of PMOS: the primate model that changed the field. Throughout his career, Dr. Abbott was also a generous mentor and beloved instructor, helping faculty, trainees and students understand the complexities of research and achieve their career goals.

María Virumbrales-Muñoz selected for BIRCWH program

Building Interdisciplinary Research Careers in Women's Health (BIRCWH) is an early-career development award for scholars focused on women's health and/or sex differences research, supported by funding from the NIH Office of Research on Women's Health. The BIRCWH award will support Dr. Virumbrales-Muñoz's project *Development of a human engineered model of ovarian cancer for translational studies*.



Study by Division of Gynecologic Oncology members selected for ACOG Roy M. Pitkin Award

Established in 1998, the Roy M. Pitkin Award recognizes excellence in obstetrics and gynecology research. The study *Ultrasonography-Based Measurements of Endometrial Thickness in Patients With p53 Abnormal Endometrial Carcinomas*, published in *Obstetrics and Gynecology* by senior author Dr. Lisa Barroilhet, assessed accuracy of endometrial thickness as a screening tool in patients with abnormal endometrial cancers.

RESEARCH AND DISCOVERY

UW Collaborative for Reproductive Equity funding renewed for three years



Established in 2018 with a grant from a family foundation, the **UW Collaborative for Reproductive Equity** (CORE) is a multidisciplinary research collective that brings faculty and trainees from across the University of Wisconsin–Madison campus—as well as from other universities in Wisconsin—together to investigate the barriers and supports to reproductive autonomy in the state. In 2026, [CORE received a renewal grant](#) that provides \$5.5 million to support research for the next three years, including \$1.7 million in the first year.

Research from CORE in recent years has generated quantitative and qualitative data on the real-life impacts of Wisconsin’s abortion and contraception policies on patients, providers, families, and communities, as well as on the reproductive health needs and preferences of various communities.

In the previous grant cycle of 2023-2026, CORE researchers published 60 peer-reviewed publications. Beyond their academic work, CORE leaders intentionally translate their research into formats that can be used by reproductive health stakeholders. CORE’s briefs, infographics, and reports are in high demand from policymakers, advocates, professional associations, healthcare providers, public health departments, and more.

Cardio-Obstetrics Clinic brings multidisciplinary approach to complex care

Cardiovascular disease has become a leading cause of pregnancy-related illness in the United States. In October 2025, the Center for Perinatal Care launched a [Cardio-Obstetrics Clinic](#), a multidisciplinary clinic to care for pregnant people with cardiac conditions.

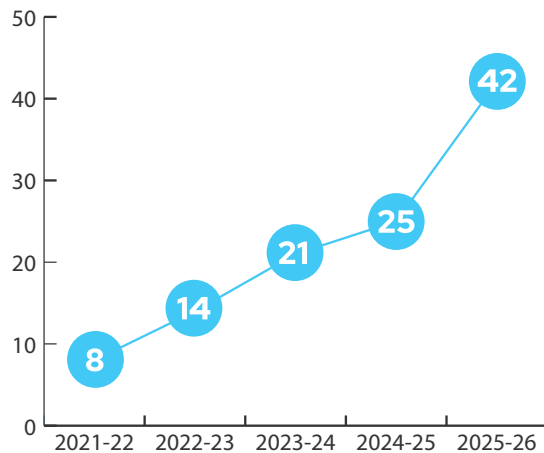
Dr. Kara Hoppe, who helped develop this clinic in close collaboration with cardiologists in the UW SMPH Department of Medicine, describes pregnancy as a stress test for the body: “Your blood volume increases 30 to 40 percent, your cardiac output increases. There are a lot of people who have underlying cardiovascular risk factors or an underlying cardiac condition that becomes unmasked with those changes,” she says.

With appointments that can include physicians from Maternal-Fetal Medicine and Cardiovascular Medicine, and nurses and experts from the Center for Perinatal Care, Cardio-Obstetrics patients can get streamlined, coordinated care that addresses all aspects of their pregnancy and cardiovascular disease collaboratively. The clinic has been busy since it opened, with high patient and provider satisfaction.

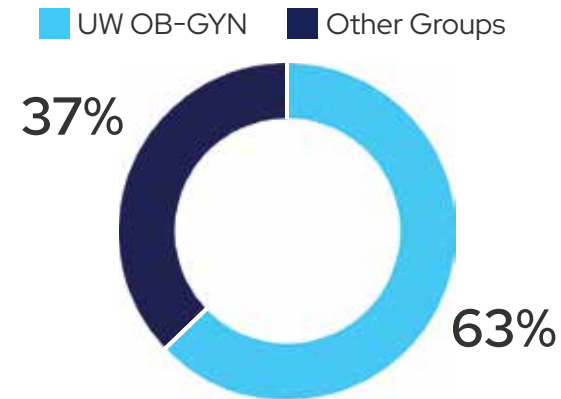

Minimally Invasive Gynecologic Surgery relocates to Eastpark Medical Center

The Minimally Invasive Gynecologic Surgery program relocated to Eastpark Medical Center, the new UW Health outpatient medical center on the far east side of Madison, in April 2026, expanding opportunities for connection with providers in the UW Health Integrated Specialty Care for Women program, physical therapy, behavioral health, and more.



Peer Support program expanded to improve provider wellbeing

The UW Health Peer Support program is a confidential service available to clinicians who need emotional support or resources for challenging work situations, difficult clinical events, and other common stressors. This year, the UW Department of OB-GYN Wellness Committee increased the number of trained peer supporters in the department, expanded the possibilities for peer support at Meriter Hospital, and created an automatic process to reach out to the peer support network when challenging events occur.

ENGAGEMENT & ADVOCACY

We strive to help individuals better understand their own health, and to shape the future of clinical care, education, and research in Wisconsin and across the nation. UW Department of OB-GYN engagement and advocacy efforts include serving in local, regional, and statewide reproductive health organizations, advocating for expanded OB-GYN research funding and healthcare access, sharing expertise in the media, presenting research on national stages, and more. Together, we aim to ensure that all Wisconsinites can access comprehensive, high-quality OB-GYN care.

ENGAGEMENT & ADVOCACY



***Pregnancy Trust and Safety Symposium* tells patient, provider stories about pregnancy care in Wisconsin**

In March 2026, the UW Department of OB-GYN partnered with the Wisconsin Department of Health Services Maternal Mortality Review Team and Maternal Health Innovation Team to present the [Pregnancy Trust and Safety Symposium](#) to an audience of 150 health care providers, community experts, and scholars. The event promoted maternal health and longevity through improved clinical care, and was supported by a grant from the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists Collective Action Advancing Respect and Equity (CA2RE) program.

Led by **India Anderson-Carter, MD**, assistant professor in the Division of Academic Specialists in OB-GYN, and outreach program manager **Julia Reeves, MPH**, the event created space for dialogue on actionable change to support positive birth outcomes and experiences. The event included an update from the co-chairs of the Wisconsin DHS Maternal Mortality Review Team; a video showcasing patient and provider perspectives from across Wisconsin on trust and safety in pregnancy care; a panel discussion; and a training to support providers who work with patients with substance use.

Attendees reflected that the summit increased their awareness of the challenges faced by pregnant people in Wisconsin. In the post-event survey, 100% of clinicians “strongly agreed” or “agreed” that the summit provided them with tips, tools and strategies to improve patient-provider relationships.

Wisconsin enacts postpartum Medicaid extension, covering 12 months after births

In 2026, Wisconsin became the 49th state in the country to provide 12 months of healthcare coverage for birthing people. More than one third of births in our state are covered by Medicaid. Gaps in healthcare for postpartum people are a major contributor to adverse maternal and infant health outcomes. Extending Medicaid coverage for one year postpartum is a necessary step towards improving maternal and infant health in Wisconsin.

Many members of the UW Department of OB-GYN were tireless advocates for this measure, knowing how life-saving this coverage can be for postpartum patients. Faculty and trainees shared stories and insights with media and with the Wisconsin legislature to help people understand the impact of healthcare access on postpartum health. Their efforts were crucial in extending Medicaid coverage for Wisconsinites who need it most.
